Materials & Pattern

Back Hook

Hook: #6 ring eye, 3X or 4X streamer hook

Thread: 6/0 (color of choice)

Tail: Marabou (with Flashabou if desired)
Hackle: Strung hackle or Schlappen (preferred)

Body: Ice Dub (or Kystal chenille)

Legs: Two barred Sili Legs, one each side

Wing: Marabou to match tail

Articulation Point

Wire: 0.38 mm braided stainless (Beadalon)

Bead: one glass bead Adhesive: Zap-a-Gap

Front Hook

Hook: #4 ring eye, 3X or 4X streamer hook

Thread: 6/0 (color of choice)

Tail: Marabou

Hackle: Strung hackle or Schlappen (preferred)

Body: Ice Dub (or Kystal chenille)

Legs: Two barred Sili Legs, one each side

Wing: Marabou to match tail

Collar: Ice Dub

Head: brass cone head (large)








The photo in last month's newsletter reminded me of a trip we took to North Arkansas

with our dogs several years ago. It was the first for Sissy, a Pomeranian we had rescued the previous winter.
