

January Meeting Recap

Jane and Tom Gallenbach of River Ridge Guide Service gave an excellent presentation on the White Bass Run. This East Texas phenomenon is just around the corner. During February and March the White (or Sand) Bass begin their run from the deep waters of Toledo Bend up the Sabine River to their spawning arounds.

One very interesting tidbit from their presentation was that most all of the White Bass in each school will be the same size as they stay together



you are catching one-pounders, you better move on to the next school if you are looking for that record fish! Also, these bass grow quickly and will only live for about five years. Most of us practice catch and release, but this would

be the perfect opportunity to put some fish in the freezer!

Erik Dilts showed us how to tie a clouser minnow - the preferred fly for the White Bass Run. These can be tied in a variety of colors. According to Jane, make sure to have plenty of red head and either white (best) or chartreuse body on hand. This is the killer combo!





Anglers from novice to expert will gather at TFFC to celebrate the sport of fly-fishing. Attend seminars and demonstrations led by fly-fishing professionals of which one will be our own Tom Bullock, conducting a presentation on wet flies.



Throughout the day, experienced flytiers will be demonstrating and teaching

fly-tying in the Anglers Pavilion on a one-on-one basis. In addition, group instruction in beginning flytying will be offered in the Hart-Morris Conservation Center classroom beginning at noon. Both are offered on a walk-up basis. Ven-



dors of fly-fishing services and equipment will also be available.

Fly-fishing clubs from across Texas will be on hand to help anyone who wants to learn or improve existing skills. Equipment will be provided for casting classes, but participants are welcome to bring their own gear. Fly-fishing kayak style will also be presented on the shore of the casting pond. Do-it-yourself fly-fishing for rainbow trout, sunfish and catfish will be available all day in TFFC's ponds and streams.

Seminars will brief visitors on where and how to



fly-fish in fresh and salt waters for a variety of species. There will be a presentations on fly-fishing the Brazos River and the history of rainbow trout in North America.

Other activities include learning about fish



and their habitats, touring both inside and outside hatcheries and sampling Dutch oven cooking. It's all included with your regular admission price of \$5.50 for adults, \$4.50 for seniors 65 and older, and \$3.50 for children ages 4-12. 


