# April Fly of the Month Sponsored by Bass Pro Shops®

Last month, the fly we featured in a n d our Bass Pro Shops workshop was the Tussel Bug. With the fishing starting to shift towards warmer waters around here, the Tussel Bug is perfect as it is a great warm wafly that will catch bream, crappie, bass, and the occasional catfish. Fish love this fly and will hit it hard. Work the tussle bug by stripping it, trying different retrieval speeds. Fish will inhale it while it sits on the bottom, and at other times they like it stripped fast.



The Tussel Bug is a woven fly. Woven flies are very insect-like with their segmented and striped bodies. Their appearance is appealing to both fish and humans. Although the weaving technique is simple to master, a woven body is certainly worth the extra effort as they are extremely durable. You will probably lose them before you wear them out. Once you learn the technique you can turn out the flies very quickly.

#### Materials:

Hook: size 10-14 Mustad Streamer Thread: 8/0 Uni Thread Eyes: Dumbbell or Bead Chain Body: Embroidery Thread or Chenille (yellow and orange, orange and black, black and green, green

white, etc.) Tail: Crystal Flash in same colors as thread

#### Recipe:



Place the hook in the vise and wrap a thread base halfway back to the bend.



Wrap thread forward to a point about the length of the dumbbell eye from the front of the hook. Tie in eyes using figure



Take two strands of crystal flash and double them over 3 times. Tie this in on top of the hook shank. Wrap thread forward, trim front end of crystal flash. Trim rear of crystal flash in random lengths with the longest about 3/4 as long as hook shank. Wrap the thread back to hook bend.



Tie in two different colored strands of embroidery thread or chenille about six or seven inches long, and wrap tying thread for-



Wrap thread back to just before ward to just behind dumbbell eyes (Continued on page 6) the bend.

leaving about an inch of embroidery thread or chenille overlapping the eyes.



Fold front of embroidery thread or chenille back down the hook shank toward the bend, about 1/3 of an inch, wrap with tying thread and trim embroidery thread or chenille. This makes your tapered body.



Bring your tying thread forward to just behind eyes. Put a drop of superglue in front on figure eight wraps where the eyes meet the hook shank. Do a couple more figure eight wraps over wet glue, and trim tying thread. Invert the hook in the vise (the hook rides up on a tussle bug). Now you are ready to begin weaving the fly body.


The Tussle Bug involves a simple "granny knot" type weave. To accomplish this, two contrasting colors of material are tied onto a hook. The weave starts at the rear of the hook just before the bend. After your two strands of material are tied in, do a half hitch and cut off the tying thread. Turn the vise to a position where the hook eye faces you. Let both strands of material hang down naturally below the hook.

Tie a granny knot with the two



strands, MAKING SURE THE DARKER STRAND IS BEHIND THE LIGHTER ONE WHEN YOU BEGIN THE KNOT. Do not pull the tag ends of the strands to tighten the knot just yet.

Separate the darker strand from



the lighter one with your fingers and put the dark one on top of the hook shank and the lighter one below the shank. Now, pull on the tag ends of the strands and tease the knot as far back on the shank as possible.



Repeat this process until you reach the eyes, making sure the dark strand is in the back of the granny knot when you begin, and the dark strand ends up on top of the hook when you separate the two strands. After a few of these knots you will see a very nice woven body pattern start to emerge.



Hold the two tag ends of woven threads together and twist them into a "rope" about 3 times and lay across the eyes. Tie it off just in front of the eyes and trim excess.

Wrap tying thread to make a nice head, whip finish, and cement





the head. That's it, you're done!



## The Founding of the NLFF by Jeff Guerin

Well, I looked and looked through all of the dozens of hard copies I still have of NLFF club newsletters and failed to find the very first newsletter I put out following the organization of the club. I know I've had that in my possession for years, but now it's not with all those others for some reason... I still think I must have it, though. It was a one page "letter", typed on an old Remington typewriter (I was an aspiring outdoor writer at the time) thanking those who showed up for the organizational meeting of the North Louisiana Fly Fishers and announcing when the next meeting would be held!

This all got started in late 1983, some time after Jim Simpson and I had randomly run into each other at King's Hardware on Line Ave., both looking for stuff that we could use for fly tying! He said he had an old buddy who was into fly fishing like him — one Kyle Moppert. The three of us started tying flies together at my house for months.

When a friend of Kyle and Jim did a newspaper article about a

trip they had made together to the Little Mo', they were tracked down by attorney Glenn Walker. Glenn was as excited to see the article as the three of us had been to hook up and he called Jim and Kyle! Walker knew Mel Horton who owned Toad Road Tobacco Shop and suggested that we should all get together!

Of course, we did and we started hanging around "The Toad's" as Mel's was widely known. We set up a kind of community fly

#### From Our Members

When one schedules a fishing trip in Florida late in the month of March, one can be reasonably con-

fident in good weather, warm temperatures, and good fishing. Well 2 out of 3 isn't always bad. As luck would have it, my friend's daughter had a wedding on the beach at the end of March on the Emerald Coast of Florida. My wife and I thought it would be a great chance to escape the rain in north Louisiana, and while down there, why not schedule a day of fishing while waiting for the blessed wedding event on Saturday evening. The wind was 6-8

miles per hour, and not a cloud in the sky. Great weather. Except that the cold front that moved in the



day before the wedding had morning temperatures in the low 40's, with a high in the mid 50's. So much for warm weather.

The surface temperature of the

water dropped 12 degrees the day before we arrived, pushing all the fish down deep to stay warm.

The least affected of the gulf fish by this would be redfish, so that was the target of the day. This was a run and gun day, looking for diving pelicans, gulls, and loons. The schools of reds that patrol the bays this time of year feed primarily on large schools of baitfish. This pushes the bait up

near the surface, where the birds feast on the lethargic bait fish because of the cold water temperatures. Each group of birds that you

find, you get one really good shot at launching a full sinking 350 gr line with a big clouser into the melee, and if you are lucky, you may get bit.

tying bench there and Mel allowed us to come to the shop and just sit and tie. Toad Road (possibly where the "Home Again" shop on Youree Dr. at Southfield is now, or at least next to it) was a rather eclectic place at the time, home to pipe and high end cigar enthusiasts, serious dart aficionados, and a few fly fishers - us!

Back then we all suffered from the illusion that each of us had to be the only ones in Shreveport who owned a fly rod! We spent afternoons fishing at what was affectionately known as Zeke St, behind the now new car wash at East Kings and Shreveport-Barksdale!

In the summer of 1984, at Glenn

Walker's suggestion, we decided to put a notice in the newspaper (What? No internet???) and spread hand written fliers that there would be an "organizational" meeting for fly fishers at Mel's. We quickly found out there was quite a bit of interest when some days later, thirteen people arrived at Toad Road and the North Louisiana Fly Fishers was created! Early on, we had a three man Board that did the governing of the club and it was some years before it was even suggested that we create the positions of President and Treasurer. Of course, early on there was no treasury to oversee! It was mostly a bunch of folks getting together to talk about gear and flies and where we could go fish!

Humble beginnings to say the

least. Ten years later there were over one hundred members, and after predictable highs and lows, the NLFF is as strong as ever!

#### Setting Up Recurring Events on Smartphones

Ever needed to setup a recurring event with an interval such as "the second Tuesday of the month" on your smartphone? While Android has been able to do this for quite some time, this feature has just become available in a recent iOS upgrade. Now that this option is available on all smartphones, we are going to provide detailed instructions for Android and iPhones using our club meeting as an example.

For iPhone users:

Tap on the Calendar App.

Tap the "+" sign in the upper right hand corner.



Under "Title" type NLFF Meeting.

Move down to "Start Time" and enter 6:00 pm.

Tap "Repeat", then "Custom" and "Frequency".

Move dial to "Monthly" and tap "on the...".

Move dial to "second".

Move dial to "Tuesday".

Tap "<repeat" in the upper right.

Tap "<New Event".

To add a reminder, scroll down and tap "Alert" and select the alert you would like.

Tap "Add" in the upper right hand corner.

For Android users:

Tap on the Calendar App.

Locate the date of the next meeting

on the calendar and long-press it.

Tap the drop-down box.

Here you can select either phone or your email address. (Select phone to get a notification on just your phone. Select your email address to get an email notification sent. (Hint: If you select email, you will get an email on all your devices, ie phone, tablet, laptop, etc.)

Type "NLFF Meeting" on Event name.

Tap the drop-down box with the time in it and set it for 6:00 PM.

Tap the Details button.

Scroll down to REPEAT and tap the drop-down box.

Tap "Monthly (every second Tue)"

Under Repeat until, select "No end date" and tap "OK".

Scroll down to REMINDERS and set the reminder time and type.

If you want other reminders, tap the "+" next to Add reminder.

You can get creative with the reminders. For instance, mine is set for "1 day before" so I can plan my day, "1 h before" so I can be there on time, and "On time" so I can get the meeting started on time as one of my duties as NLFF Secretary.

While it has been frustrating in the past to not be able to set up recurring events on the iPhone, we hope these instructions help you figure out how to set recurring events in your calendar whether it be an Android phone or an iPhone.


