Adam Harbuck from Harbuck Outdoor Sports was our guest speaker for October. His presentation, Kayak Fishing 101, gave us



some insights into what equipment is necessary for kayaking.

Adam and his helpers from Bayou Pirates, a local kayak fishing club, brought several yaks for us to try out on Lake Caroline at the refuge boat dock. Sit On Top (SOTS), Sit Inside (SInKs), and hybrid kayaks are the three main types of kayaks available. SOTS, identified by scupper holes for drainage, set you up higher and above the water line. SInKS set you lower as your seat is below the water line. Hybrids are roomy and can carry high payloads - think plastic pirogue. See picture at left.

Fly of the Month - "Wiggle Minnow"

Editor's Note: With the bass bulking up for the winter this time of year, I thought this fly would be an excellent choice for our area lakes when you can't get up to the trout waters.)


November's Fly of the Month is Todd Boyer's Wiggle Minnow. It's "walk the dog" motion and how it mimics a fleeing shad coming out of the water just drives the bass crazy!

Materials List -

Hook: TMC 8089np Size 2 Thread: Danville Flat Wax Mono Loop: 20 lbs Mason Tail: Crystal Flash and Polar Flash Body: Wapsi Foam Cylinder 3/8" Diameter Eyes: Plastic Eyes with "Stem" Markers: Chartpak


Recipe -

1. Start at the hook eye and wrap back to cover the entire hook



barb. It's very important that's where you stop your thread.

2. Tie in mono loop, make sure the tag ends are on top of the hook shank and not on the sides. Don't make the loop too bigabout the size of a pea.



3. Tie in your flash, about 5 or 6 pieces. Make sure flash is about the length of the hook shank.



4. Take about three cuts of polar fiber in each color, pinch the polar fiber right in the center and tease out the under fur with a comb. It's important not to build up to much of the tail with bulk as it will knock down the wiggle.

shank stopping just beyond the 5. Tie in your tail. Make sure the length of the tail is just a little longer than the hook shank. If you get it too long. it will also knock down the wiggle.



6. Take your cylinder and make a 45° cut at the very end of the cylinder making sure that you cut towards the top of the cylinder and not the back. Use a SHARP razor blade, very important that your blade is very sharp.



7. Take your cylinder and turn it upside down and dive your razor blade in about 1/4 of an inch behind the lip.

European (Euro) Nymphing Method

by Tom Bullock

In average fly fishing circles, Euro nymph fishing is probably the least understood method of fly fishing in America today. It is, however, the standard in Europe and within the international competitive fishing lot of fish. Bill was Euro nymph fishing and also catching a lot of fish. We were camped in the Quarry Dam Campground with one RV spot between us. I was with Davy Wotton a couple of days later and mentioned Bill Welz. Davy renot consider myself advanced in the Euro method, but I do catch my share of fish using it.

I just returned to Shreveport after spending a month in Broken Bow, OK fishing the Lower Mountain Fork River (LMF). The river has changed




community by all serious competitors, including the USA Team.

I was introduced to this method about four years ago by a stranger, Bill Welz, who has become a close friend, while fishing on the Norfork River in Arkansas. I was wet fly fishing and catching a sponded, "Bill Welz is one of the most advanced Euro nymph fishermen in the United States." I started listening to him more intently after that and Bill started learning the more advanced wet fly method I was using. In my opinion he is now one of the most advanced fishermen I know in both disciplines. I do

 Make a cut down the entire length of the cylinder. Make the cut about 3/4 of body depth leaving.




- 9. Bring the razor blade back to the front of the cylinder. Place the corner of the razor blade back into the cut and push the corner of the blade towards the face and make a little cut in the center of the face.
- 10. Place the cylinder on the hook shank sideways and push the eye of the hook through the cut at the face of the cylinder.
- 11. Turn the cylinder on the hook and push the cylinder down on the hook shank. The back of the cylinder should end up right in

front of the tail. If you have to bend the cylinder to get it to go in front of the tail you didn't go back far enough on the hook shank.



12. Turn the fly over and then push the back and the front of the cylinder up making sure the cut is lined up with the hook point. Place a bead of Zap-a-Gap the entire length of the cylinder starting at the back.



- Squeeze the entire cylinder and hold for 15 seconds. Wipe off excess. Be sure and use Zap-a-Gap. It works best.
- 14. Go to the front of the fly and push the cylinder down making sure the hook eye is in the center of the face, then shoot some

Zap-a-Gap in the slit above the hook eye. If you use the zap attachments you should be able to do this easily. Squeeze and hold for 10 seconds.



15. Color back with marker, then pull the edges down with a gun cleaning cloth blending the color in. Do this fast so the ink doesn't dry. If it does, just go over it again. Turn fly over and do the same for the bottom.



- 16. Take you plastic eyes, these are the ones with the stem on them. The best way to take off the stem is to cut it off flush with toe nail clippers.
- 17. Place a bead of Zap-a-Gap on the body (not to much) and

glue the eye on. Push and hold for 10 seconds. Do the some with other eye.

- Make a sideways 'V' from back to front to add stripes.
- 19. Fire Tiger pattern polar fiber colors are chartreuse/fire or-

ange, eyes are red, marker

colors are chartreuse/ cadmium orange, cylinder color is yellow, and stripes are black.

20. You can make these any color you want. Patterns that I tie are brown trout, rainbow trout, fire tiger, shad, white, white/red head, chartreuse/white and black.

21.1 use tan cylinders for brown trout, yellow cylinders for fire tiger, and white for the rest.

Presentation Tips -

Using a no-slip loop knot adds much more action. For a top-water

bite, use floating line, strip and pause until you see the fly again at the surface. The fly has a slow wobble back to the surface that drives fish nuts. Tied right, this is the only true riding wiggle minnow there is- strip it as fast as you want and it won't roll over. That's why it is so effective on sink tips. Use about 4 feet straight fluorocarbon to get deep on sink tip. This is one of the most productive flies that there is. I know- bold and biased, but true. My Wiggle Minnow has out-fished many of the famous flies out there. It has caught just about every thing that swims- salt or fresh. Give it a try. I know you won't be disappointed! 🔊



Creek. The water appears to be just waiting for Euro nymph methods.

I wanted to speed my learning of the "New River", so I hired a guide to show me the changes. The guide, Kevin, who guides in the Lake City, CO area in the summers and LMF in the winter, was return-

ing to Colorado the next day. He did have a half day available and was excited extremely when he learned that I would be using the Euro nymph method. He had heard and read about it but had never seen it fished.

There was an area below the bluffs with swift pocket water about 8 feet deep, with a direct dropoff and undercuts.

There was no conventional way to get the flies to the bottom and to the fish quickly except the Euro nymph method; very heavy flies with long thin leaders. Many of the fish in the area were washed down river during the flood.

I caught several fish in the deep

pockets. One fish in particular was a brown trout which measured a little over 18 inches. This is not a huge fish, but it was reported by the Beaver Bend Fly Shop to be one of the two known brown trout caught in this part of the river since the flood and by far the larger of the two. Also, this fish was caught on a Monday when over 30 cars were counted on the road the precurrent plan is to show an introduction DVD, European Nymphing 101, at the Red River National Wildlife Refuge, November 14, 2015 starting at 5:00pm with discussion and a covered dish dinner. 


From Our Members

Let me begin this tale with this statement - Everything you are about to hear is true, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth. So help me God!! (This statement is included because my friend Bill Welz says that only 30% of what a fisherperson tells you is true.)

because the water was too fast and too deep so we decided to move to Evening Hole.

We arrived at Evening Hole and started making our way down stream toward the gravel mounds. I was using my 11' rod rigged with a

ing was rising but after a few minutes I got a hit and pulled in a bright orange with blue stripes large bream. I kept working upstream with no success and several fly changes and a complete re-rigging after a battle with a cypress tree. (I always lose that one.)

I had been watching fisherman another gu river at the area where the river narrows right before the gravel wash begins and he seemed to be the only person catching anything. I worked my way up there and went to the opposite side

of the river from him and watched him a little while before deciding how I wanted to fish the area. I first thought I might fish the shallow water around the area because I could see some fish in it but that was unfruitful so I decided to go deep in the heavier water and see what happened. By this time I was using a large wet fly with some weight for my anchor and hanging a soft hackle green wet fly. Two casts and I hooked a nice rainbow. Thought I had it figured out.

I was standing in the shallow wablack copper john dropper. Noth- ter casting into the deeper water

when something to my left caught my eye. At first I thought it was part of a broken off log sitting in the bottom of the river but the longer I looked at it the more I thought I saw it move. I took a few steps closer and sure enough it was the biggest rainbow trout I had ever seen in my life just laying there taking it easy in the shallow water. It was at least 30" but could have been more. It did not seem to be at all intimidated by me as I moved closer to it and at one point

it even came toward me as if it was checking me out.

As I watched this monster I began to see his pattern. He would lay in the shallow water for a few minutes and then sort of drift off into the deep water. In about five minutes the dropper and the worm on the end so that it would float up from the wooly.

I made about three or four casts with that set up when I thought I was hung up on a rock. I didn't give the rod much pull, just enough to be sure I was hung when it moved and I knew it was a fish - a large fish. I

he would be back in the same place in the shallow water. This went on for about 30 minutes. It was driving me crazy because I had no idea what to do to try and get him on my line. Then I decided the thing to do was find the heaviest thing I had in my fly box and tie it on my dropper and put a fluorescent worm Tom Bullock had given me on the end. I tied on a large black cone head wooly as rodeo and let the fish have some room. I was walking up and down in the shallow water yelling for Johnny to come and help me and letting the fish d o as i t pleased. Then all of a sudden it came toward me in the shallow water and I realized it was the

was trying to be so

careful not to play

big fish!!!

I knew I was in trouble because I had #4 tippet and there was no way it would be able to handle a fish that size. I took a deep breath and tried to relax and not over work the fish, just let him go where he wanted. Johnny was making his way toward me when the fish came back up in the shallow water again so that I could see him clearly and then it turned and took off like a streak of lightning and that was the end of that. Before I could give him enough line to run he snapped the tippett and was gone.

My attempt at relaxing had been a total failure and my heart was still pounding in my chest five minutes after I had lost the fish. I was sick but I do not think there was anyway for me to land ***** that size fish with #4 tippet but it was fun trying. (One of you expert anglers would have known exactly what to do.)

It was a once in a lifetime fish and I am glad I was able to hold on to it as long as I did!!


