
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August Meeting Topic

NLFF's 5th Annual Masters Series

GEORGE DANIEL IS COM-ING TO OUR CITY

The dust hardly settled from fly fishing's world renowned icon Bob Clouser's completion of North Louisiana Fly Fishers' (NLFF) 4th Annual Masters Series in Bossier City than the NLFF scored a massive coup. The NLFF was able to fit into George Daniel's already full 2017 schedule and acquire him to conduct the 5th Annual Masters Series on July 22nd 2017. This clinic will be held, as have all past Masters Series, at the Red River National Wildlife Refuge Headquarters Building in Bossier City, LA.

For those who don't know, George Daniel was a member of the international fly fishing team, Team USA, for 7 years. During that time he won the USA National Championship two years in a row, 2007/2008 and 2009 as well as finishing in the top five at the World Championships in 2006 in Portugal. George also finished in the top 10 several other years.

After seven years of international competition George retired from competition and now coaches TEAM USA and USA YOUTH FLY FISHING TEAM, teaches, lectures, conducts clinics, writes and manages his various business activities. To date George has published two bestselling books, <u>DYNAMIC</u> <u>NYMPHING</u> and <u>STRIP-SET</u>. <u>DY-</u> <u>NAMIC NYMPHING</u> teaches the various Euro Nymph methods of fly fishing which are used all over the world in competitive as well as recreational fly fishing. <u>STRIP-SET</u> teaches various methods of using larger streamer flies to catch very large trout during daylight hours as well as night. The primary thesis is that most fish eat bugs, but big fish also eat smaller fish.

The Fly Line

Fly of the Month - Yellow-Bellied Frog

This articulated popper fly pattern created by John Collins has high movement and is tied hook-up to avoid snags. It helps you achieve a high percentage of hooked fish because the fish are no longer able to leverage a long popper hook shank in order to throw the fly.

This pattern demonstrates how the Fish-Skull® Articulated Shank[™] can be used to add articulation to surface flies such as poppers and sliders. This is an exciting growth area in fly tying and offers significant advantages over the traditional methods of tying poppers.

Fly tying materials

Thread: 6/0, olive green. Hook: Mustad, C52S BLN #4.

Popper body: EZ popper foam, long bodied.

Shank: Fish-Skull® Articulated Shank™, 35 mm.

Front legs: Round rubber legs; 2 green and 1 yellow, medium.

Back legs: 2 Hen neck feathers; dyed olive.

Hook body: Hen neck feathers; 1 dyed olive, 1 dyed yellow.

Fly tying instructions

Step 1





Paint your popper body the color you desire, then heat a bodkin and push it through the body at a 90degree angle. This will give you a hole through the body for your rubber leg. Pull threader back by pulling rubber legs into body and out the other side so length is even with tips on the other side of popper body. Cut rubber leg loops with scissors and trim both sides so all legs are even.

Step 2



Insert a bobbin threader through the hole and then insert 3 medium rubber legs through the loop in the threader.

Step 3



Put your hook in the vise and attach a hen feather on the far side of the hook, halfway down hook shank. Put the shiny side towards the hook with the tip curving outward from the hook.

Attach feather on near side of hook with tip pointing out in opposite direction. After feathers are attached, cover hook shank completely with thread right up to the hook eye

Step 6



Attach 2 hen neck feathers, by the tips at the base of the feathers that were mounted in steps 4 and 5.

Step 7



Palmer hackle the two feathers together, covering the hook shank by winding forward to hook eye. Tie off and clip excess then proceed to tie a neat head.

Step 8



Attach dressed hook to Articu-

lated Shank with point of hook mounted up. Mount shank in vise with clip side up and tie closed with with Kevlar thread. Hook should ride point up.

Step 9



Carefully squeeze some CA glue into slot on bottom of popper body.

Step 10

running the slot over a hacksaw blade.

Step 11



After embedding Shank, fill excess space with an instant epoxy, such as Clear Cure Goo or Bug Bond.

Step 12

Paint over cured epoxy, matching the color of the popper's belly.



Take finished popper body and press down onto Articulated Shank. Make sure shank is completely embedded inside of popper body, with the shanks clip side up. This will keep the shank from spinning inside the popper body. Note: Dry fit body on shank before tying. You may need to make slot deeper and wider in order to fit properly over shank. This can be accomplished by

Bluegill: Fly Fishing's Little Magic Bullet

How do we get new fly anglers interested in the sport of fly fishing? We hear this question over

Get Over It!

There's more to fly fish-

ing, "The tug is the drug." Who cares what's causing the tug as long as it's a tug? If you keep it simple, all paths lead to the bluegill.

If your buddy, wife, or even your parents express interest in taking up the sport, treat them like you would a kid. Give them a chance to be successful. Bluegill are fairly easy to catch and perhaps one of the most fun fish for the fly rod you can find. They can be taken on a

very simple fly rig. A trout-sized fly rod, a simple top-water bug (such as a popper) and you're good to go. There's no need to talk about rigging, fly line weights, hatches, or a complicated cast. Just go fishing and have fun.

Watch It!

The great thing about bluegill fishing is that it is 90% visual. If a new angler can see the fish eat their bug the chances of them getting involved in the sport are very high. The visual aspect of the sport is what drew me to it. There's nothing like seeing a fish eat your bug.

I see smallmouth bass blow up poppers, trout gently sip a dry fly, and 50" muskies crush large flies all season long. That being said, I still get just as excited watching a big bluegill slide under a bug, look at it, and then decide to eat it. It's a grand time and when it's on, it might be one of my favorite types of fly fishing. If a new fly angler can experience that, you have, in most cases, made a fly angler for life.

Experience It!

I encourage experienced fly anglers to give the bluegill a chance too. They're just pure fun.

When I'm chasing bluegills, I slip into an almost kid-like trance. These little happy fish take me back to my childhood. It's almost like I'm transported back in time to my great grandmother's resort in

Northeast Wisconsin, rowing a boat around the lake and catching fish.

There are no electronics. You don't have to worry about throwing a reach mend into your cast. You don't have to worry if you have the correct fly on. Are they taking cripples, nymphs, streamers? None of that. You're just fishing and having as good of a time that an angler can have. is better than a nice bluegill fry.

Many lakes are overrun with • them and need to be thinned. Harvesting a few doesn't harm the population. Remember, I said a few. Don't go crazy, especially if the bluegills are big. I've seen some lakes here in Minnesota get overharvested and an outstanding fishery turned into an ordinary one. Be smart about it and everything will be okay.


