

February Events Recap

Our monthly meeting gets back on track this month, meeting on the regular day (second Tuesday). Thanks to everyone who showed up at January's meeting that was delayed by a week due to Valentine's Day.

Tom Bullock gave a presentation on nymphing techniques that focused on fish-

ing the entire water column and how to increase hook-ups. Tom's



knowledge of Czech nymphing has significantly increased from his first presentation that he gave. If you missed this, be sure to attend another event where Tom will be presenting.

Tom also gave a class on Polish nymph fly weaving. The weaving technique was unique in the way that you never had to let go of either strand to do the weave. That allowed for maintaining tight wraps and

producing a fly that will hold up longer.

Fly of the Month - "Bead Head Soft hackle Hare's Ear"

This month Tom Bullock will be demonstrating some features of the Regal vise by tying a bead head version of the Soft Hackle Hare's Ear. Come to our fly tying session at Bass Pro Shops in Bossier City. (Note: A Regal vise is not necessary)

Recipe:

Hook: Size 14 2X-Long nymph


Thread: Fluorescent Pink 6/0 **Bead:** 1/8 or 3.5mm Silver Body: Light Hare's Mask Dubbing

Rib: Small Silver Wire Tail: Natural Hare's Mask Thorax: Strung Peacock Herl Wingcase: Large Pearl Tinsel Hackle: Hungarian Partridge

Feather Hot Spot: Thread **Step 1.** Slide a 1/8" bead on the hook with the counter sunk end facing the bend of the hook. Start a thread wrap around the shank of the hook and lay down an even base layer of thread (usually about 1 1/2 to two trips from the eye of the hook to the barb).

Step 2. Cut off a pinch of hair from the hare's mask, grabbing the guard hair (tips) pluck out the underfur from the bottom of the hair fibers (where you made the cut). Save the underfur to use as dubbing for the body. Measure the tail by laying the fibers on top of the hook shank with the tips roughly at the bend of the

hook and measure up to the back



of the bead. This is the point where you will tie the tail in, make a few wraps around the excess hair and work your way up to the bead and

back down to the bend of the hook.

Step 3. Cut about a half inch piece of wire and tie it in at the same spot as the tail and make thread wraps up to the bead and back down to the bend.



Step 4. Start applying light hare's mask dubbing and the leftover under fur to your thread in small amounts by twisting it between the thread and your fingers covering the expose thread between your bobbin and the hook shank (Dubbing wax or waxed thread will help this process). Once ap-





plied, start wrapping the thread

ing a tapered body to about the halfway point of the shank.

Step 5. Start wrapping the wire in even segments up the dubbed body to where the dubbing stops. Tie off the wire with your thread with a few wraps and use an old pair scissor to cut the excess wire free.



Step 6. Cut off a piece of pearl tinsel and tie it in on the top-center





of the shank, next tie in 2 strands of peacock herl in the same place (tie in at the top of the feather, this is the fullest part of the herl and will give the best results) and move your thread up towards the bead.

Step 7. Make 2 to 3 wraps with the peacock herl around the shank of the hook continuing the taper of the body and cut off the excess herl.





Next pull the tinsel overtop the herl and tie it off with a few wraps of thread.

Step 8. Take a single Hungarian Partridge feather and grab it at the tip, strip off the under feather from the base of the stem with your fingers. Once you have this done



gently separate the barbs of the

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feather at the tip of the feather creating a small triangle at the top of the feather, this will be where you tie the feather onto the hook.



Step 9. Once the feather is securely tied in make a single wrap around



the shank with the partridge feather, tie it off and cut off the stem of the feather. This step may vary with the fullness of the feather, one wrap usually does the trick but I have done as many as two wraps to get the barbs the way I want.

Step 10. Finally create a small collar between the partridge feather and the bead with thread once about even with the bead finish it off with a half hitch or whip finish and add some head cement.





The 5 Best Fly Fishing Destinations In The U.S. by Region

Today, ask almost any non-fly fisherman what one catches on a fly rod and they will say trout. As early as a few decades ago, that was universally true. Now, in addition to trout, almost all species of fish are sought after on a fly rod. From sunfish, striped bass and alligator gar to flounder, redfish and even sharks! If it swims, it can be a rewarding catch on a fly rod.

While every list can be debated, the following are what I consider the top places to fly fish in different regions of the U.S.:

West Region - Alagnak River -Bristol Bay, Alaska

The best and most beautiful fly fishing destination of all - bar none! In the Bristol Bay Region of Southwestern Alaska, the fishing season usually only lasts a few short months. But during those months, you'll find salmon, steelhead, resident rainbows, northern pike, gray-

ling, and so much more. The area is true American wilderness and nothing really compares to going off the grid to this cold state for a fly fishing endeavor. The surrounding landscapes will no doubt be some of the most spectacular you'll have ever seen, and you'll be able to reel in a wide array of species.

Southeast Region - Jupiter Inlet, Florida



There's no other spot that compares to Florida when it comes to the best saltwater fly fishing in the

States. The Keys offer everything from big, wary bonefish and wily permit, to tarpon, redfish, snook, and even largemouth bass.

Experts often say that Florida is for saltwater fly anglers as what Michigan is for freshwater fly fishermen - it's an absolute mecca of inland waters that are definitely worth checking out, since sizable fish can be found pretty much anywhere - whether in a quiet pond or a city-side canal! Get your hands on a true variety of game fish all along the Atlantic beaches just off the central Florida inlet. Find sharks, jack crevalle, cobia, red-

fish, Spanish mackerel, bluefish, and pompano. Diversity is the name of the game here.

3. Midwest RegionGlenwoodSprings, Colorado

No favorite fly fishing list would be

complete without mentioning Colorado, with attractions from the Platte River, the San Juan River, and the Colorado River, which all offer heavenly spots for fly fishing enthusiasts. The large number of beautiful locales to stop at in the region are also well-known for the high number of trout to be found in their rivers. It's truly difficult to find a better combination of gold-medal waters, blue skies, nice climates, and stunning canyons any-

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rondacks or in the Catskills, there's



where in the world besides Glenwood Springs.

Many say that it's the geographic center of the best fly fishing in the entire state. The Roaring Fork and Colorado Rivers merge right in town, and the Eagle, the Frying Pan, and the Gunnison located conveniently nearby for those who

want to take a day trip.

Northeast Region - Montauk, New York

From the Oceanside fishing of Long Island and Montauk, all the way to traditional river and stream fishing in the Adino doubt that the Empire State is a stellar fishing destination for fly anglers.

There's no need to leave the Big Apple in order to find some worldclass fly rod action because come mid-spring to mid-summer on Long Island, guides and anglers alike can be seen stalking the clear shallow flats surrounding Gardiner's Island and Peconic Bay for ample amounts of bluefish and stripers. In the late fall, there's even a Montauk craziness that ensues as huge schools of baitfish bring in tons of striped bass, blues, and albacore. Get psyched and get ready!

5. Gulf Coast Region - Coastal Marshes - Louisiana

Want the best inshore fishing in the world? Head on out to Louisiana, where fishing for speckled trout and redfish is a favorite pastime of Louisiana anglers and the thousands of visitors to the area all of whom adore the vast marshes and saltwater bays of Louisiana's coast.

The state has an amazing complex of creeks, channels, bayous, and ponds that are perfect for any

> serious fly fishing enthusiast. The Louisiana Marsh is hands down one of the Redfish best fisheries the world has to offer. So go on out to the outer marshes

While Glenwood Springs, Colorado edges out Bozeman for the Midwest title, Bozeman, Montana deserves mentioning. It would surely beat several others on this list if it wasn't by region.

It's one of North America's prime fly fishing areas for large trout, as the highly productive waters boast copious hatchings of insects yearround, as well as tons of minnows incredibly effective in attracting migrating brown trout. Montana's appeal for anglers is that of sprawling, wide open expanses which make for plenty of awesome
